

Club members Ellie Jones and Dave Shorter share their story.



This is incredibly hard to write.

After we left the Uk (last Christmas 2023) we headed to Vietnam for a family holiday on our way back to New Zealand. On the 11th Jan, just 3 days into our holiday Dave suddenly became unwell. This resulted in hospital tests in Hanoi International hospital. Doctors initially suspected an infection and thought Dave would be out within a couple of days with antibiotics so he insisted Emily, Max and myself get the planned flight down to Hoi An.

3 days later - Never would I have thought I'd be sat at the end of a phone call with Dave still stuck in Hanoi listening and being told by a doctor that they found a large obstructing tumour in Dave's bowel. The doctor strongly suspected bowel cancer and it looked to have spread! My world stopped, life stood still. It was hard to comprehend -Dave is only 42 years old. It was incredibly hard being stuck apart during this time.

We worked to get Dave back to NZ ASAP and on the 17 Jan Dave arrived back in Auckland and was admitted straight into hospital. Emily, Max and I followed the day after. I arrived back just in time to see Dave being wheeled out of keyhole surgery (to remove the tumour and a section of bowel). Recovery began, but within the following 4 days Dave deteriorated and ended up having emergency open surgery and removed more bowel that had been compromised.

Recovery restarted and on Feb 2 Dave finally came home to continue his recovery. Heartbreakingly on Feb 5th we received more bad news at the oncology trials meeting it was confirmed Dave was Stage 4 terminal bowel cancer with spread to some lymph nodes and his peritoneal lining. Coupled with this, Dave unfortunately has the BRAF v600e mutation which is aggressive and has a poor prognosis. We were told he would need palliative chemo. The world shrunk away being told Dave may only have 12-18 months with treatment. (However, these are averages and Dave has responded so well to chemo so far). A CT scan (6 weeks after his hospital CT scan) on March 5th confirmed growth in the peritoneum but the nodes were not big enough to access the trial. Dave began chemo. Due to the aggressive nature of BRAF our oncologist wanted to hit the cancer hard.

Life is in two week windows for the next 6 months. Each window is made up of chemo, blood tests, medical appointments, counselling for us all - along with chemo side effects. Dave has now had two PET scans (at 3 months and recently on Oct 2nd/ 6 month mark) both have good results which is a huge relief. What's next - Dave will continue Chemo until just before Christmas and then have another PET scan.

The emotional turmoil we have been through these last 10 months isn't possible to put into words. It has been especially hard on Emily (8) and Max (6). There has been constant worry and fear of what the future holds for Dave and us as a family. On top of this in New Zealand many cancer drugs are not funded. Dave has health insurance but it doesn't come anywhere near close enough to cover costs. Here Avastin (a highly recommended and proven to be effective component) is not funded. This means Dave has to receive this treatment in private at a cost of \$2500 every two weeks!

We have been told Dave will need BRAF inhibitors. These are extremely expensive - again unfunded - and cost \$140 000 for 6 months of treatment, then every subsequent 6 months is \$75 000. These are such huge scary costs and money we just don't have. So we are reaching out with a give a little page to try to raise funds towards Dave's future treatment. There is absolutely no pressure to contribute. Please know any contribution amount is very gratefully received and it will all help.

The last 10 months have been the biggest emotional roller coaster. It's been really hard on our family. Cancer steals from you the moment you meet it. The way we have found to challenge this is to try to create opportunities to spend quality time as a family. Now it's all about preserving as much time as possible left as a family and truly trying to make the most of it under very hard circumstances.

Waitakere Access & Kauri Dieback – the Strategy & Progress

A report from John Mackay

Last year the original research and the assertions made at the time the tracks were closed was peer reviewed. Amongst other things the review found:

- Initially, it was believed that 70% of infected kauri trees were within 50 metres of walking tracks. However this conclusion was based on a flawed mapping procedure, which started by analysing aerial photos, but then added other infected trees that were discovered by checking along tracks.
- Because infected trees within 50 metres of a track were attributed to human activity, the Kokako Block baitlines that Mike Frith and ASC members service were wrongly blamed for all of the infected trees in the Kokako Block.
- These misinterpretations had been cited to justify track closures, but the 2023 review highlighted the need to reinterpret the data using accurate spatial models
- The disease probably spreads due to other environmental factors rather than predominantly humans (e.g. soil movement in storms, introduced and native animals)
- Wild pigs, for instance, are known to uproot vegetation and disturb soil extensively, making them a potential vector of disease spread. The pigs also seem pleased about using the Waitakere tracks without having to share them with trampers
- The assertion that, if kauri died the rest of the forest would die along with the birdlife it supported, was debunked by ecologists
- There's no clear scientific data showing whether track closures or upgrades have improved kauri health. There hasn't been a controlled study to compare areas left open versus those closed
- The disease and the Phythophthora fungus is most concentrated at two old sawmilling sites.
- The disease is spreading much more slowly than originally expected

This peer reviewed research led us to believe that many tracks would soon be reopened. The hopes were premature however. Because of the slow spread, the Council decided that a longer period would be required to reach conclusions from the research! There are nevertheless a few things to be grateful for:

- We've earned brownie points from the Council by being co-operative with their processes. Mike Frith, Joe Scott-Woods and others have liaised with the track and research contractors and ensured that our hut is available for them as a base (earning extra hut revenue along the way). Some of us have volunteered for track upgrade working parties. I'm the Council's track auditor for Comans Track.
- Early on, with the help of the incredibly patient Stu Leighton, we were able to have Cutty Grass Track re-opened as a necessary east-west link across to Scenic Drive.
- The Cascades Kauri Track loop was recently opened up to the public and now a cascade of wooden steps down to Fairy Falls has opened (see photo on next page). Like the few other re-opened tracks they are so popular that the track and parking areas are often overcrowded.
- Stu Leighton is also working towards a connection from Scenic Drive and the Fairy Falls Tracks across to the camping ground in the Bethells Valley.
- The priority is to link up tracks to enable longer distance tramps. This is likely to continue most urgently along the coastal edge in the form of the Hilary Trail (Although this is vulnerable to landslips and the withdrawal of owner permissions)
- Above all, the maps now show the old tracks as being "temporarily closed," so the worry that the tracks might never re-open has receded.

Despite these advances, the standard that tracks, boardwalks and staircases must be built to is expensive. Many trampers are offended by the wooden stairways and other structures that are being imposed on otherwise natural areas. Moreover, the three-year budget for research has not been renewed. With both the government and council focused on trimming their budgets, it would be unlikely that most tracks can be funded to re-open within our lifetimes.

ASC, like most tramping clubs, supports the FMC's approach, as led particularly by Tony Walton. The aim is to engage positively with key players in the Council, Government and iwi, in an attempt to understand their positions and work towards better solutions for kauri dieback and track access.

There have been some promising political developments recently but we've seen false dawns before, so don't hold your breath!




RUAPEHU HUT WARDEN REPORT FROM GEMMA SEDDON

The club was saddened to hear that Beryl passed away on October 10th.



They will be awarded annually to the child, children or family who have contributed the most to ASC trips and tramps during the year





Inspired by the ground-breaking Marathon of Afghanistan , Timatanga Hou welcomes you to the first-ever Aotearoa Afghanistan Marathon. <u>The Aotearoa Afghanistan Marathon</u> is fuelled by the spirit of inclusivity and friendship, and is an event that combines running with celebrating the many cultures of Afghanistan. Come join us on **Saturday 16th November 2024** in Riverhead Forest for a truly unique event that has been developed In close consultation with the founders of the original Afghanistan Marathon. To evoke the original context of the Kohi Baba mountain range, high in the Hindu Kush, Timatanga Hou/New Beginnings have created courses largely based on the unsealed road network in Riverhead Forest.

While waiting for runners to return or after the event there will be a range of delicious Afghan food on sale including traditional Kabuli pulao - tasty bits of tender lamb in a bed of fragrant rice. Bolani - a fried flat bread unique to Afghanistan and mantu - delicious meat stuffed dumplings. And, of course, different kinds of chai or tea without which no Afghan meal would be complete. In addition, there will be musicians playing hazargi music on the Dambura and Dutar and hazargi dance including the Afghan "stick dance" along with Afghan handicrafts including carpets.

All proceeds from the event are going towards similar future projects.



TRIP REPORTS.

Thursday Walk on 24th October 2024 - An Epsom circuit culminating in a visit to Auckland's Government House gardens.

The route took us from Eden Gardens to Mt St John/Te Kopuke and then back to Government House by early afternoon. On the way we passed turn-of-the-century mansions (like Florence Court), negotiated a remnant of the original Maungawhau lava forest in Withiel Drive, and admired the facilities of Dilworth and Diocesan schools.

The access to Te Kopuke is steep, with lots of steps on the western side, but morning tea at the top revived our flagging energy. After descending Mt St John we continued our walk along Ranfurly Road to the old (and now deserted) Training College grounds.





The leaders had been a bit ambitious, planning to lunch on Mt Eden/Maungawhau before reaching Government House, but time was short, so we found a pleasant spot to stop and eat, then took a shorter route back along some very delightful streetscapes to Government House. Gardener Josh, together with a police officer who checked our credentials, was waiting at the gate, ready to show us around. The 4.6 hectare (11 acre) property dates from the 1860s, so some of the trees are well over 100 years old.



The Mappins, who bought the property in 1921, spent 45 years developing a gardenscape around the underlying geology, and planted many special trees and shrubs, both native and exotic. We marvelled at huge Pohutukawa, Norfolk pines, Redwoods, Port Jackson and Moreton Bay figs, to name only a few of the iconic

trees and at the borders of colourful shrubs and perennials around well-manicured lawns. All this is maintained by just two gardeners. It is no wonder it is designated a Garden of National Significance. Our 90 minute tour was an experience we will never forget.

The destination of the Pararaha valley with a relatively short walk in from Karekare meant that those of us on a tight schedule could arrive later and leave earlier the next morning to attend to other commitments. The initial group walked in at lunchtime and a small group of us set off just before dinner, the yellow lupins looking spectacular in the setting sun as we headed towards Whatipu.



Given the amount of gravel on the re opened tracks in the Wàitakeres, the walks along the coastal fringe still retain a sense of remoteness and the feeling of being fully immersed in nature.

Obviously we were not the only ones thinking that way as on arrival at the campsite, despite all of us booking our spots via the Auckland Council website ,it was pretty full, a group of trail runners, some individual trampers and a large Duke of Ed group from Baradene.



We briefly contemplated nipping back to the empty Tunnel Point campsite but elected to find a spot to pitch our tends and instead make some new friends. In total there were 15 in our group and we had a lovely evening, sharing dinner together before a rain shower sent everyone running to the cooking shelter.



The next morning the early departees, headed back along the little ridge by the lake under the cliff to Tunnel Point, through the tunnel and along the old tram line before heading back out along the beach rather than walk the whole way over the sand. Tunnel Point is such a wonderful little campsite and a great place to take kids for their first overnight tramp. Somewhere along this track I lost my drivers licence out of my pocket and was pleasantly surprised to get a phone call two days later from the Onehunga Police Station to say it had been handed in, thus saving me the hassle of organizing a replacement. Another very enjoyable little adventure in

the great company and I heard the same comment over and over again "it hard to believe we are only an hour from Auckland"
